(A mí) Me ⁽²⁾	<i>Gusto</i>	(Yo)	<i>I please myself.</i>	<i>I like myself.</i>
(A ti) Te	Gusto	(Yo)	I am pleasing to you	You like me.
(A Ud./él/ella) Le	Gusto	(Yo)	I am pleasing to you/him/her/it.	You like me. He/she/it likes me.
(A Uds./ellos/ellas) Les	Gusto	(Yo)	I am pleasing to you all, them.	You all/they like me.
